Supportive Housing System Progress since 2015

- 6,937 persons permanently housed including 1,237 veterans
- **\$950M Housing Bond** implementation is ahead of schedule;
- City of San Jose set aside **45% of housing funds for ELI households**
- 1,537 service-enriched apartments built or underway;
- Increased PSH capacity by 72% and RRH capacity by 114%
- Increased temporary shelter capacity by 126%
- Established a new homelessness prevention system and increased homelessness prevention capacity by 340%






- 80 households Homeless, disabled, and high-users of VMC / County Health System

 - 6 for Extremely-Low Income Households




Home Not Found: Cost of Homelessness in Silicon Valley (July 2015)


