LIVERPOOL, Dec. 6, 1839.

SIR: Last Saturday the demand for Cotton in our market was lively, and the sales amounted to fully 5000 bags, which, with the exception of 200 bags placed to speculators, were taken by the trade, producing a partial advance of 1/4d. to 3/4d. per lb. On Monday business was done to the same extent, and yet confidence was impaired, inasmuch as the advance of Saturday, 13th ultimo, was no longer insisted on, nor, indeed, attainable. This alteration in the tone of our market was occasioned by advices brought by the "Great Western" steamer from New-York, dated the 16th ult., stating that the weather had been unusually favorable for the picking of the new crop of Cotton, which was therefore expected to exceed previous estimates. Our transactions since Tuesday have consequently been on a reduced scale, and mostly at rates 1/4d. to 3/4d. below our quotations of last Friday. Speculators have not only ceased to be our customers, but we have had sometimes to compete with them in the capacity of sellers; whilst, during the same time, the demand for export has been very limited; so that nearly our sole reliance has been on consumers, who, though they have now, for some days, bought sparingly, seem rejoiced at the prospect of increased supplies to prevent any undue enhancement, without expressing a wish for any material depreciation below the

ADVANCE.—The little tin which appeared Monday and Tuesday in the Piece and Yarn market has since become nearly extinct, it being impossible to make sales to any extent trifling advance paid on the days in question. Although prices cannot be quoted lower than Tuesday, still there is less doing, and a demand exists for which no one was prepared three days ago. Both spinners and manufacturer decidedly in a worse position than on the week, on account of the advance in Cotton.
