

The Indian Business Alliances (IBAs)





The IBA Purpose





The IBA Organizational Model










- Loosely structured alliances of volunteer partners



 - Workforce development resources




FINANCIAL RESOURCES



IBA Impacts










- New or renewed Tribal constitutional reform and/or revision initiatives








• The collective work of the IBA partners is positively impacting attitudes, policies, resource availability, laws and financial resources for Native business owners and, in turn, Tribal economies.
